Rangel Gets New Post

Charles B. Rangel, former Assistant United States Attorney, has resigned to accept a post as executive director of the Manhattanville Hamilton Grange District of the Neighborhood Conservation Program, it was announced by Harry Harris, director of the program.

Mr. Rangel, who had served for more than a year in the

U.S. Attorney's office, succeeds Attorney Clifford Alexander in the \$9,000-a-year post. Mr. Alexander recently joined the Harlem Youth Opportunities Unlimited project.

The Hamilton Grange district is one of seven conservation areas which the city has selected to test and develop techniques to aid in combatting blight in neighborhoods before they become complete slum sections. It is bounded by 130th and 133rd Sts., between Amsterdam and Convent Ave.

Alphas Will Cite Randolph, Javits

A. Philip Randolph and Republican Senator Jacob Javits are to receive the annual human rights award of Alpha Phi Alpha at the fraternity's dinner on Oct. 14 at the Hotel Roosevelt, Madison Ave. and 45th St., it was announced this week.

Randolph is the only Negro vice-president of the American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations. He also is president of the Negro American Labor Council which has been pressing for complete integration of the Negro in the nation's workforce.

The labor leader is to be paid

the fraternity's highest tribute for his "leadership in mobilizing citizen support behind the efforts of the non-professional hospital workers" and "his unswerving record to aid the underdog of all races."

Senator Javits will receive the award for sounding the alarm many years ago "that urban renewal should not mean Negro removal."

The fraternity also praised him for his courageous welcome last spring of "the first so-called reverse freedom riders" who came here from Louisiana, "courtesy" of the White Citizens Council of New Orleans.
