\$650,000 Will Go to Five Colored Men as Commis-Writes Denial.

Washington, Nov. 24.-William H. Lewis, former Assistant Attorney General; Emmett T. Scott, sec retary and treasurer of Howard University: James A. Cobb, a Washington attorney; William L. Houston, a member of the Washington Board of Education and Rev. Ernest Lyon of Baltimore, aco charged by Senator Harrison, Democrat, of Mississippi, with having a contract with the government of Liberia under which, if the \$5,000, 000 Liberian loan bill passes the Senate, they are to receive a com-mission of \$650,000.
